

# WORKSHOP PANELISTS' BIOGRAPHIES

## > MAARTJE ABBENHUIS

Maartje Abbenhuis is Associate Professor in Modern European History at the University of Auckland. Her research specialities are in the history of neutrality and internationalism, particularly in the period 1815 to 1919. She is the author of two books: *The art of staying neutral: The Netherlands in the First World War 1914 - 1918* (Amsterdam, 2006) and *An age of neutrals: Great power politics 1815 - 1914* (Cambridge, 2014). She has also worked on the history of borderlands, and representations of war, peace and Nazism. At the moment, she is writing a global history of the Hague peace conferences, with the working title *Awakening world society: The Hague 1898 - 1915*, funded by a prestigious Royal Society of New Zealand Marsden Grant.

## > VENKAT RAMANA RAO ADONI

Venkat Ramana Rao Adoni has experience in Security, Cyber Crime Investigation & Digital Forensic Analysis for implementing better information security management practices in the field of Information Technology. Professor Beigbeder began his career with the War Crimes Tribunal in Nuremberg. Beigbeder has written numerous books and articles on international organizations, international criminal justice and recently published *French Justice towards Independence: Political pressures, international constraints and reforms* (L'Harmattan, 2013).

## > SUHANI BHUSHAN

Suhani Bhushan completed her Master of Arts in Global Governance at the Balsillie School of International Affairs in Waterloo, and her Honours Bachelor of Arts at Wilfrid Laurier University in Political Science with the Legal Studies and Research Specialization options. ### > THOMAS BIERSTEKER

Thomas Biersteker is the Gasteyger Professor of International Security and Conflict Studies and Director of the Programme for the Study of International Governance at the Graduate Institute, Geneva, since 2007. He received his Ph.D. and M.S. from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and his B.A. from the University of Chicago. Biersteker served as Director of the Watson Institute for International Studies at Brown University from 1994 to 2006 and has also taught at Yale University and the University of Southern California. In 2002 he was named a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, New York. Biersteker is the author/editor/co-editor of nine books, including *State Sovereignty as Social Construct* (1996), *The Emergence of Private Authority in Global Governance* (2002), and *Countering the Financing of Terrorism* (2007). He is currently completing an edited volume on UN Targeted Sanctions as Instruments of Global Governance. His current research focuses on UN targeted sanctions, the emergence of transnational policy networks in global security governance, and the dialectics of world orders. He was the principal developer of SanctionsApp, a tool for iPhone and Android mobile devices created in 2013 to increase access to information and improve the quality of discourse about targeted sanctions at the UN Security Council.

### > INGVILD BODE

Ingvild Bode is a Japan Society for the Promotion of Science (JSPS) International Research Fellow (postdoc) at the Institute for Sustainability and Peace, United Nations University, Tokyo. Dr. Roger Coate is Paul D. Coverdell Professor of Public Policy at Georgia College and Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Political Science and former Director of the Richard L. Walker Institute of International Studies at the University of South Carolina. His research and teaching interests focus on international organization, multilateral relations, and global governance with concentration on leadership issues, international organization reform, international administration and development, the role of civil society in global governance, transnational non-profit management, and U.S. multilateral foreign policy. He is author or co-author of more than a dozen books and monographs, including: *The United Nations and Changing World Politics*; *Identity Politics in an Age of Globalization*; *United Nations Politics: Responding to a Challenging World*; *International Cooperation in Response to AIDS*; *United States Policy and the Future of the United Nations*; and *Unilateralism, Ideology and United States Foreign Policy: The U.S. In and Out of UNESCO*. Among his other activities, Coate has served as: member of U.S. National Academy of Science's Board of International Scientific Organizations; member of the UN Secretary-General's Advisory Panel on Housing Rights; United Nations Fellow at the UN Centre for Human Rights; staff consultant to the U.S. Secretary of State's Monitoring Panel on UNESCO; member of the U.S. Delegation to the 31st UNESCO General Conference in Paris; and advisor to the Bureau of International Organization Affairs, U.S. Department of State. Coate currently serves as Vice Chair and Member of the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors of the Academic Council on the United Nations System.

### > MIRIAM CULLEN

Ms. Cullen is a Ph.D Fellow at the University of Copenhagen Centre for International Law and Justice currently working as a Visiting Professional at the Office of the Prosecutor of the International Criminal Court. He serves as Special Advisor to the Head of the Peace Support Operations Division of the African Union Commission. He serves on the editorial boards of the journals Global Governance and Peacebuilding. De Coning has a Ph.D from the Department of Philosophy at the University of Stellenbosch. De Coning's main research focus is on AU, EU and UN peacekeeping and peacebuilding policies and practices. ### > ALVARO DE SOTO

Alvaro de Soto's 25 years in the UN Secretariat spanned the terms of three Secretaries-General starting in 1982, including 13 years in senior positions in the Secretary-General's office. He conducted the 1990-1991 negotiations that led to the comprehensive peace accords which ended the war in El Salvador. He was the UN Special Envoy for Myanmar (1995 to 1999). He mediated the 1999-2004 negotiations on the Cyprus problem which led to parallel referendums on the comprehensive UN settlement plan. He was Special Representative for the Western Sahara (2003-2005). He left the UN after two years (2005-2007) in Jerusalem and Gaza as the chief UN envoy for the Arab-Israeli conflict. Among current affiliations he is a member of the Global Leadership Foundation and a Senior Fellow at the Ralph Bunche Institute in New York. Since 2011 he has led a masters level seminar course on post-Cold War conflict resolution in the Paris School of International Affairs (PSIA) at Sciences Po, in Paris.

### > WILFRIED DE WEVER

Wilfried joined the Hague Institute for the Internationalisation of Law (HiIL) in October 2012. He is the Head of the HiIL Innovating Justice Hub and he coordinates the Justice Investment Programme, bringing investors in touch with top justice innovators. The network ranges from private individuals such as lawyers or judges who want to invest in justice initiatives, to professional venture capitalists and institutional investors. His main responsibilities: supervising [www.innovatingjustice.com](http://www.innovatingjustice.com), the scouting for world class justice innovations, setting up local or specialized Innovating Justice Hubs and partnership programs, developing Innovating Justice events and guiding innovation scale up processes. After more than 8 years of advisory experience in international (justice) integration projects, he went on to found, and preside over a global NGO working on justice effectiveness named "Effectius". In addition, he worked with several start-up ventures focusing their strategic aims and strengthening their international presence. A strong educational background combining law, economics, entrepreneurship and business makes for a broad foundation. His analytical, open mindset and strong language skills are indispensable assets for building long term strategic partnerships on a daily basis.

### > LUCAS DOTTO

Lucas Dotto's diversified research interests include emerging technologies to combat global anthropogenic climate change, geoengineering governance, contradictions in nuclear weapons policy, the developing interrelationship between the West, China, Russia, and Iran, and the science and theatrics of speechwriting in politics. His work experience has been in the post-secondary education policy field. Working for the Ontario Undergraduate Student Alliance he co-authored one of the first reports on program differentiation in Ontario, a process which many schools are now undergoing. Dotto's eclectic life has seen him represent Canada at the World Youth Fly Fishing Championships, recruited to write for the Vancouver Canucks at 17 years old, manage a professional soccer team, and he has produced, directed, written, and acted in the Fringe Festival for over six years. ### > WILLIAM DURCH

Dr. William J. Durch is a co-director of Stimson's Future of Peace Operations program. Prior to joining Stimson in 1990, Durch served as a foreign affairs officer with the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, as a research fellow at the Harvard Center for Science and International Affairs, and as assistant director of the Defense and Arms Control Studies program at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Since joining Stimson, he has been seconded as a scientific adviser to the U.S. Defense Threat Reduction Agency, and served as project director for the landmark Panel on United Nations Peace Operations (the Brahimi Report, August 2000). Durch also serves as a consultant to the International Forum on Challenges of Peace Operations and for the United Nations on projects focused on improving the effectiveness of peacekeeping at headquarters and in the field. He has taught courses on international organization and peacekeeping at the School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University; at the School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University; and the Elliott School of International Affairs, George Washington University. Durch holds a Ph.D from MIT (Political Science/ Defense Studies), a Master's degree from George Washington University, and a Bachelor of Science in Foreign Service from Georgetown University.

#### > LORRAINE ELLIOTT

Lorraine Elliott is Professor of International Relations in the School of International, Political and Strategic Studies, College of Asia and the Pacific at the Australian National University. She has previously held appointment as Reader in International Relations at the University of Warwick in the UK and visiting appointments at the University of Oxford (Balliol College), the London School of Economics, the Free University of Amsterdam, the Rajaratnam School of International Studies at Nanyang Technological University in Singapore, and the University of Sheffield. She is the author or editor of 6 books and more than 80 refereed journal articles, book chapters and working papers in three overlapping areas of endeavour: global governance including the UN system; global and regional (Asia Pacific) environmental politics; and non-traditional security including human security. Her work has been funded by grants from the Australian Research Council, the Royal Netherlands Academy of Arts and Science, the Japan Foundation, the US Institute of Peace and the Canadian Government. Professor Elliott is also a member of the Australian Committee of the Council for Security Cooperation Asia Pacific (CSCAP) and the international advisory board for the One World Trust. She is a Vice President of the Executive Committee of the International Studies Association Asia Pacific region. She also contributes to capacity building and professional development activities for younger scholars, having undertaken such roles in Australia, Indonesia, the UK and Japan including with the European Consortium on Political Research, and the United Nations University.
